### **Teaching Innovations**

#### **Course or Curriculum Development**

I have spearheaded several teaching innovations within the Department of Anthropology by playing a leadership role in the curriculum development in medical anthropology and global health. After coming to Maryland in 2012, I developed two new courses in medical anthropology and global health for undergraduate and graduate students: an I-Course (ANTH265: Anthropology of Global Health) and a Scholarship-in-Practice Course (ANTH310/665: Method and Theory in Medical Anthropology and Global Health). Both of these courses now are core components of the new BA/BS degree in Anthropology. I also restructured the introductory Sociocultural Anthropology class (ANTH260) required for the BA/BS degree in Anthropology by adding ethnographic texts to the reading requirements and making the course more writing-intensive. In addition, I redesigned and added a new curriculum to ANTH606-Qualitative Methods in Applied Anthropology, a required course for anthropology graduate students, based on my extensive background in conducting qualitative methods training for professionals



outside academic settings. In 2012, I was tasked by the Office of Facilities and Management with a collaborative project for ANTH606 students on the redesign of McKeldin Mall with the Department of Landscape Architecture and the I-School that resulted in recommendations to the University. In subsequent years, students in ANTH606 have presented findings from their class projects at internal and external conferences such as Anthroplus (the annual Department of Anthropology student conference) and the annual American Society for Engineering Education meetings. Finally, in 2016, I was recognized by the American Anthropological Association (AAA), the world's largest association for professional anthropologists, for my expertise in teaching anthropological and mixed methods research. I am a member of the AAA's latest project, "Digital Management for a New Generation," funded by the National Science Foundation for the development of university graduate-level research methods courses and professional development seminars.
